2011 Annual Meeting April 29 to May 1 in Las Cruces

Mike Hughes, Annual Meeting Chair for the Doña Ana Archaeological Society, announces that the ASNM 2011 Annual Meeting will be held in La Cruces next April 29 to May 1. The host facility is the Ramada Palms Hotel, 201 East University, Las Cruces. A special room rate for the meeting is \$79.00 plus taxes for a room with one bed and \$89.00 for a room with two beds, provided the Archaeological Society of New Mexico is mentioned when making reservations by April 14 at (575) 526-4411. A full weekend of activities is planned, including Friday evening reception and registration 5 to 8 p.m. at the hotel, registration and paper presentations and posters all day Saturday, the Awards banquet preceded by a social hour Saturday evening, and the Bandelier Lecture by Christine S. Van Pool of the University of Missouri at 8 p.m. Dr. Van Pool's subject is "The Casas Grandes Symbolic System and Recent Research at the 76 Draw Site near Deming, New Mexico." Tentative plans for the Sunday field trips include a rock art site normally closed to the public, a walking tour of historic districts, and visits to local museums. HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MEETING OF THE TRUSTEES JANUARY 29, 2011

Treasurer Anna Walters reported on ASNM financial records for the fiscal year 2010 and presented a proposed budget for 2011, copies of which are attached to this newsletter. The Trustees voted unanimously to again make a donation of \$250 toward the poster for Heritage Preservation Month.

Budget and Finance Committee Chair John Roney reported that the committee consisting of Anna Walters, Phyllis Davis, Sheila Brewer, and himself had reviewed the books and found them to be complete, up to date, and in good order.

Certification Council Chair Roger Moore outlined the council's discussions of integrating with the SiteWatch program and on seminars being planned. Instructors are needed to cover dating, research design, prehistoric material culture, and excavating. The Council will meet Friday afternoon April 29 following the Trustees' meeting.

Nominations Committee Chair Charlie Barnes noted that the terms of Arlette Miller, Bradley Bowman, Carol Condie, and Gary Hein are expiring. All but Miller have agreed to continue on the board. Additional nominations are being sought from the Affiliate Societies.

Publications:

Annual Volume: Emily Brown, Editor, announced that there are 18 papers in the 2011 volume honoring David Kirkpatrick and Meliha Duran. It is proceeding on schedule.

The Trustees chose Carol Condie as the Honoree for 2012. Two runners-up will be included among the nominees for 2013.

Special Publications: Dave Kirkpatrick, Chair, reported that the Casamero Report will be ready for sale at the Annual Meeting. The Marjorie Lambert memoir is still in process.

Emily Brown said that the reprint volume of H. P. Mera's *Technical Series Bulletins* should be at the printer by the end of the year.

Richard A. Bice Archaeological Achievement Award Chair Bradley Bowman reported that for the first time in many years, several candidates had been nominated by Affiliate Society presidents. The Trustees voted to limit the number of awards in any given year to three. All of the candidates being deemed worthy of the award, it was decided to choose the winners by lot and to hold the others over for consideration next year.

Historian/Archives: Joan Mathien reported that she is resigning from her position as ASNM Historian to devote more time to the report on the Vidal Site. The Vidal report is progressing; the next step will be choosing informative samples for pollen and flotation analyses. See her detailed report below.

Rock Art Council Chair Gary Hein announced that the next meeting of the Council will be held concurrently with the Certification Council meeting on Friday afternoon April 29 after the Trustees adjourn.

Scholarships Chair Greg Sagemiller is reminding his university contacts that the deadline for applications is near. Ted Frisbie has offered to serve as a mentor to scholarship recipients. The recipients will be notified of his offer. The board unanimously voted to add Dr. Frisbie to the Advisors with responsibility for mentoring scholarship recipients.

New Mexico Archeological Council President Doug Dykeman outlined recent activities and issues that NMAC is dealing with. There will be a Mimbres workshop in May, and NMAC will also consider participating in the Conference on Archaeoastronomy of the American Southwest. Their web site is nmac.org.

New Mexico Historic Preservation Officer (Interim) and Acting State Archaeologist Jan Biella said the budget constraints remain very tight. She encouraged members to monitor the legislature (currently in session) for relevant issues. She thanked the board for its donation to the Heritage Preservation Month poster, and noted that nominations for the Heritage Preservation Awards are needed. The web site is nmhistoricpreservation.org.

New Mexico SiteWatch Coordinator Norm Nelson reminded the board that SiteWatch's annual meeting is Feb. 20 at the Hibben Center. There are 15 chapters in New Mexico.

By-laws Revisions: Helen Crotty presented revised By-laws for consideration. The By-laws were last revised in 1988, before the Internet was easily available. The Board discussed some of the proposed revisions and will review

the remaining proposals and questions and suggest additional changes online so they can approve a version to be presented in writing to the membership for a vote at the annual meeting in accordance with the present By-laws.

Annual Meeting 2012: John Hayden proposed that the 2012 annual meeting be hosted by the Torrance County society and Friends of Tijeras Pueblo, with a focus on the Salinas area, and encompassing geologic and paleontological aspects as well as the history and archaeology of the Estancia Basin salt lakes.

VIDAL SITE PROJECT PROGRESS REPORT (F. Joan Mathien)

Work on various materials from the Vidal Site is going forward in several directions. Now that all the records and artifacts are at the Maxwell Museum of Anthropology at the University of New Mexico, Karen Armstrong and her volunteers have been able to repackage the animal bones, as well as pollen, flotation, and soil samples in accordance with Museum of New Mexico collections guidelines. As of January 31, 2011 they were about one-third of their way through the entire collection. When this task is finished, information on all rebagged items will be entered into a computer database that can be used to retrieve specific items for research purposes. Based on progress to date, ASNM is now in a position to negotiate a contract for analysis of human remains with the Osteology Laboratory at the University. Currently Joan Mathien is also reviewing the proveniences for pollen and flotation samples to determine which ones make good candidates for examination of the floral species utilized by the people living in and around the Vidal community. Once this is completed and quotations received, she will advise the Board of the costs involved before proceeding to write a contract for analysis of these materials. Mathien is also conducting a review of the extant computer files to determine the status of the various chapters of the final report. It is apparent that a few are finalized, and one author is in the process of updating her chapters. But many more remain in various stages of preparation. Some of the latter will need volunteers to examine the data and complete the write-ups. We will have a better idea of the status of the volume later this year.

ASNM HISTORIAN/ARCHIVIST POSITION OPEN

Since the mid-1980s, the position of the ASNM Historian/Archivist has been filled by Joan Mathien. Since she has taken on the coordination of the Vidal Site Project report after the death of Dick Bice, she has announced she would like to pass this position on to another ASNM member. This represents a golden opportunity for an ASNM member who enjoys learning about the history of the society and participating more fully in its activities.

In the current ASNM Standard Operating Procedures, the Historian maintains the Society's permanent file—that is, collects, organizes, and files information relating to the history of the Society and its affiliated local societies, with a view to making this information available through publication. The Historian (Chair of the History Committee) may research Society records, newspaper files, and any other published or unpublished sources available and to interview membership as time and opportunities permit. He or she receives non-current material from the Secretary and others, gleans significant items from it and adds these to the historian's permanent file. In practice this entails collecting the files from the various officers, Board members, ex-officio trustees, and advisors and putting them into acid-free folders so they are ready to turn over to the repository (Museum of Indian Arts and Culture/Laboratory of Anthropology archive) whenever an updated chapter of the ASNM history is prepared and published. This was last done in 2000.

Anyone who enjoys history should grab this opportunity by contacting ASNM President Doris Morgan. The President appoints the Historian plus selected assistants (if any) who serve on the History Committee, subject to Board approval.

NEWS OF ROCK ART COUNCIL MEMBERS' PROJECTS (Continued)

The Santa Fe Rock Art Recording Group (Gary Hein)

We continue to record along the Santa Fe River in the area that Bruce Dickson surveyed for his Arroyo Hondo research. By the end of this season we had almost completed the area we started last season. We have invested several weeks of walking transects to ensure we have full coverage of the area. The return was great in terms of rock art as well as sherds and lithic material.

The more we explore this area the more concentrations of rock art we find. The area consists of an escarpment, tumble zone of various widths, slope, new escarpment, new tumble zone and new slope. We have also noted various features that seem to be part of the historic occupation of the area.

We have surveyed approximately 80 acres and recorded 628 panels consisting of 1,740 design elements. We have

also noted the location of 10 downed telephone poles and 10 survey boundary markers. Typically we have two teams in the field each week and occasionally just one.

Last spring we worked with the Carlos Gilbert Elementary School. Gary gave a 45-minute presentation to the third grade class. The presentation was followed by a class visit to the La Cieneguilla site. We used rock art recording as way to teach the students about preservation and protection of cultural resources. Paul Anderson, Kathy Fiero, Pat Rouch, Ed Lewis, and Gary Hein appreciated the thank-you cards the students sent us.

Sacred Sites Research, Inc. (Larry Lowendorf)

In the past half-year, Sacred Sites, a recently formed non-profit New Mexico company, has concentrated its efforts on finding examples of the incised motifs that are beneath pecked petroglyphs dated to the Archaic. Working with volunteers from the Raton area, they found several incised grid patterns beneath Archaic-age pecked circular forms at a site about 15 kilometers east of Raton, New Mexico.

Sufficient numbers of these incised petroglyphs have been discovered to begin to classify them into categories that include multiple parallel lines, parallel double lines, intersecting lines, asterisks, cross-hatch or grid patterns, bisected ovals, point on lines, and zigzag or lightning-like patterns.

CHACO ROCK ART FUNDRAISER TOUR May 5-9

The Friends of Chaco Rock Art have scheduled a fundraiser tour of rock art sites in the Chaco Culture National Historic Park for May 5-8. Activities begin Thursday evening with dinner and orientation. On Friday, the Park archaeologist will lead an introductory tour of architectural structures. Participants will also visit the related sites. The following two days will be devoted to visiting rock art sites, the majority of which are normally closed to the public.

Camping will be provided in the Park with limited showers with hot water. Participants must provide their own camping gear. Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be provided, including breakfast on Monday morning, May 9.

The tour is being offered to help fund the materials and expenses of on-going rock art documentation in the Park, because the National Park Service no longer has the funds to adequately support projects they endorse. The cost of the 3-day, 4-night tour, including all meals, is \$750, much of which is tax deductible. The tour is limited to 9 persons. Mount Taylor Stripped of Traditional Cultural Property Designation. It was about respect, said the Acoma, Hopi, Laguna, Navajo and Zuni tribes in mid-2008 pitching the designation of Mount Taylor as a traditional cultural property. A year later the TCP designation was a done deal, except that some other guys felt they were given insufficient respect. So they sued the New Mexico Cultural Properties Review Committee and Acoma Pueblo. The petitioners included individuals, uranium mining companies and the Cebolleta Land Grant.
