## REGISTER NOW FOR ASNM 2013 ANNUAL MEETING MAY 3-5 IN ALBUQUERQUE

The ASNM Annual Meeting will be held at the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center in Albuquerque, which promises to be an ideal venue for us. In addition to its meeting rooms, it has its own museum and art galleries, a gift shop, and restaurants on the expansive premises (check their website). Arriving registrants should use the south parking lot and the **south entrance** and will be directed to the registration table in the meeting area. Registration will be open Friday from 4 to 7 pm, as will the poster display, with a cash bar/reception from 5 to 6, an Indian Taco buffet supper (with vegetarian selections available) in the meeting room from 6 to 7:30. The evening program will begin at 7:00 and will give special recognition to Kathryn (Kit) and Arnold Sargeant and the excavation of the Chamisal site on their property in Ranchos de Albuquerque.

The morning program begins at 8 a.m. (registration opens at 7:30) with welcomes and a symposium on the Chamisal site: the project, its ground stone tools, mortuary practices, ceramics, and the sources of the ceramic materials. The symposium is a preview of an upcoming publication. There will also be a paper on the Alameda School site (LA 421) and a slide show of rock art along the Rio Grande from Santa Fe to Socorro. The ASNM business meeting starts at 1 p.m, followed by a session of contributed papers covering a variety of topics from Chaco to Piro to Mimbres and points in between. One of our scholarship awardees will be a presenter.

Vendors' tables will be located in the meeting room for sales Friday evening and Saturday during breaks. Ted Frisbie will have some special offerings in addition to his usual Zuni jewelry and fetishes: a book about the George Hamilton Pepper Expedition to the Southwest (see review, page 2) and "Navajo Pawn" (at 1/3 off) via Father Blane Grier, Chinle Mission (Our Lady of Fatima). Bring your check books! Ted donates 10% of his sales proceeds to the ASNM scholarship fund.

The evening program begins with a social hour/cash bar 5:30 to 6:30, Awards Banquet 6:30 to 7:30, followed by the Bandelier lecture at 8 by Matt Schmader, Albuquerque City Archaeologist: "A Short History of the Last 5000 Years of Life along the Rio Grande."

Sunday's field trips offer a variety of options from a museum and art gallery tour of the Indian Pueblo Cultural Center followed by Native American dances, guided tours of the mural room and the ruins and restored kiva at Coronado State Monument, rock art hikes on Tomé Hill or at Petroglyph National Monument; a tour to San Ysidro to view the 46-room Pueblo III AS-8 Pueblo and the Cañada de las Milpas, which were excavated and surveyed, respectively, by AAS members 1975-1986.

Conveniently located right across 12<sup>th</sup> Street from the IPCC is the Holiday Inn Express Old Town, which is offering a **special group rate for reservations made by April 19**. See the attached registration form for details and the Group Block Code required for the special price.

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FEBRUARY 2, 2013 MEETING OF THE ASNM BOARD

**Treasurer's Report:** Anna Walters presented a year-end financial report for 2012 and a proposed budget for 2013 (attached, pages 7 and 8) as well as other detailed fiscal information. The proposed budget was approved by the Trustees to be distributed to the membership for approval at the annual business meeting May 3, 2013.

**Internal Financial Review Committee Report:** John Hayden, Chair, reported that on February 2, 2013, the ASNM Internal Financial Review Committee, consisting of John Hayden, George Ruebelmann, and Patricia Wing as well as Treasurer Anna Walters, conducted a review of the Society's 2012 financial records and found them in excellent order.

**Certification Council:** Roger Moore presented a draft of the Council's brochure listing the archaeological classes offered. The brochures are to be distributed at the Annual Meeting and to Affiliate Societies and SiteWatch, and posted on the ASNM website. The Trustees unanimously approved an expenditure of \$400 to \$500 for printing costs.

**Nominations Committee:** Charlie Barnes noted that the response to requests for nominations and phone calls had yielded only "maybe next year" responses, but that the four sitting Trustees whose terms expire in 2013 have agreed to run again. They are Karen Armstrong, Charlie Barnes, Hayward Franklin, and Doris Morgan. The ballot and short biographies are on pages 5 and 6. **Mailed ballots must be postmarked by April 29.**

**Honoree Nominations Committee:** Hayward Franklin presented the nominations and supporting documents for several candidates. The Trustees voted Sheila Brewer as Honoree for the 2014 ASNM Annual Volume. Sheila is a long-time member and former co-president of ASNM's Gallup Affiliate, the Plateau Sciences Society. She assisted the ASNM Vidal Site Field School in various capacities, including crew chief, photographer, lithics analyst, and official rattlesnake catcher. She is a former Trustee and current Advisor to the ASNM Board and serves on the Certification Council and Scholarship Committee. In addition, she has all but single-handedly documented the rock art sites in El Malpais National Monument.

**ASNM Donations:** A donation of \$250 for poster publication to the New Mexico Heritage Preservation Alliance was approved unanimously. By a 4 to 3 vote, the Trustees approved a donation of \$250 to the Archaeological Legacy Institute, which produces a monthly half-hour show on archaeological subjects available via their non-profit streaming video website, The Archaeology Channel <archaeologychannel.org>, as well as on cable TV in cities across the US. They hope to add a New Mexico cable site.

**ASNM 2014 Annual Meeting:** Charlie Barnes announced that the Grant County Archaeological Society will host the meeting April 11-13, 2014 in Silver City, and he will serve as Chair.

## BOOK REVIEW

*Ancestors and Descendants: Ancient Southwestern America at the Dawn of the Twentieth Century* (Selections from the George Hamilton Pepper Native American Archive at Tulane University's Middle American Research Institute and Latin American Library), by Paul J. Tarver and Cristin J. Nunez, 2010. New Orleans Museum of Art, New Orleans. 128 pp. \$24.95 (cloth) ISBN 978-0-89494-111-5.

Who knows anything about the life and accomplishments of George Hamilton Pepper in the Southwest beyond his Pueblo Bonito 1896-1899 excavations (including the richest burials ever found in the Southwest)? Unequivocally, the answer is very few! This volume provides a wealth of information about his life and work both within Chaco Canyon and the rich happenings that transpired afterward until his untimely death at the age of 52 in 1924. Between excavation seasons at Chaco and during 1901 and 1903, with intermittent trips until 1910, he studied contemporary Pueblo and Navajo culture and—sponsored by the American Museum of Natural History and private collectors including George Heye, Phoebe Hearst and Emily de Forest—collected thousands

of ceramics, textiles and baskets. In 1910 Pepper became the assistant curator for George Heye, who had amassed the largest private collection of Native American art in the world. In 1916 the collection provided the material for the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation. Pepper's affiliation with this museum continued until his death.

Within a month following Pepper's death his widow, Jessie Crellin Pepper, sold his personal research materials (field notes, journals, etc.), correspondence, and over 1000 photographs and lantern slides to Tulane University. Additionally, she donated his personal Southwestern material culture collection with the understanding that a permanent exhibit as a memorial to her husband would be established. In 2009 the "Pepper Archive" and other materials were transferred to the New Orleans Museum of Art for display and storage during renovations to the building where they were housed at Tulane. A major result was the Pepper exhibit and accompanying publication. The latter provides considerably more than the usual exhibit catalog because in addition to the descriptive text for each of the 160 photographs, material culture items, and the hand-tinted lantern slides Pepper used in his highly acclaimed lectures, the authors have worked them into six well researched chapters (incorporating additional appropriate photographs). There is a highly insightful conclusion as well.

This volume clearly delineates the life and work of an early Southwestern fieldworker in both archaeology and ethnology. The fact that his claim to fame has been limited to Pueblo Bonito considerably pales when one learns of his other accomplishments presented herein. The authors/curators are to be commended on a job well done! In my opinion, the book belongs on the shelf of anyone interested in Native Americans past and present. ### **Dave Brugge and Linda Cordell**

*March was a sad month, indeed, for Southwestern Archaeology in general and for the many friends and colleagues who mourn the loss of two such warm and friendly human beings who gave so generously of their expertise and of themselves, as the numerous online tributes testify and to which I add my own here. Both will be sorely missed.----hkc.*

### **David Martin Brugge**

**September 3, 1927 – March 15, 2013**

David was born and grew up in Jamestown, New York. He served in the US Army at the end of World War II and attended the University of New Mexico on the GI Bill, graduating with a BA in anthropology in 1950 after only three years. While working for the Unitarian Service Committee in Gallup, he met Ruth (Sherlog) Brugge, a social worker from Massachusetts. They were married in Mexico in 1959 (Ruth died in 1990). Dave worked for the Navajo Tribe in the 1960s, and their three children, Doug, Steve, and Janet, spent their early childhood on the Navajo Nation. From 1974 to his retirement, Dave worked for the National Park Service. He was best known for his scholarship and advocacy on behalf of the Navajo people. He is the author of *The Navajo-Hopi Land Dispute: An American Tragedy* (UNM Press, 1994) and numerous other works. He received an honorary doctorate from UNM in 2005 in recognition of his many intellectual contributions. Dave was an active member of the Albuquerque Archaeological Society and a former president (1991-1993) of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico, where he remained on the Board as an Advisor and was the honoree of Annual Volume 24 (1998). At Dave's request, no service is planned, but a celebration of his life will be held at Steve Brugge's home, 803 Maverick Trail SE, Albuquerque, on Sunday, June 23, starting at 5 p.m. The family is planning an informal dinner for all who come. ### **Linda S. Cordell**

**October 17, 1943 – March 30, 2013**

Linda was perhaps the best-known scholar of the prehistoric American Southwest for her time. Quite literally, she wrote the textbook—*Prehistory of the Southwest* (1984), *Archaeology of the Southwest*, second edition (1997), *Archaeology of the Southwest*, third edition (2012)—used in most college courses on the subject. She was the author or editor of many other volumes and papers, as well. She taught at the University of New Mexico from 1971–1987, then spent four years at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. In 1992, Linda joined the faculty of the University of Colorado, Boulder as Director of the University of Colorado Museum and Professor of Anthropology until her retirement in 2005. She was appointed Senior Scholar at the School of Advanced Research in 2006 and a member of the External Faculty at the Santa Fe Institute in 2010.

Throughout her career, Linda enjoyed teaching undergraduate and graduate students, directing archaeological field schools, developing museum exhibitions, and conducting collaborative research. She regularly attended the Pecos Conferences and last year led a field trip “Pecos Before Pecos” that included visits to the Rowe and Arrowhead Ruins sites. In recent years, she took an active role in creating the exhibits for the Friends of Tijeras Pueblo (the Pueblo had been the site of one of her field school excavations). A celebration of Linda's life is planned for late May or early June, but date and place had not yet been determined at press time. ## 2013 CANDIDATES FOR ASNM TRUSTEE

**Karen Armstrong** discovered anthropology as an undergraduate at Occidental College and graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a B.A. degree in Cultural Anthropology. Finding that she disliked prying into people's lives as a cultural anthropologist, she turned to archaeology and earned an M.A. in Anthropology from the University of Illinois. She has done field work in sites in Great Britain, California, Arizona, Colorado, and New Mexico and has continued her anthropology education with a number of classes at UNM. She has been active in the Albuquerque Archaeological Society, Friends of Tijeras Pueblo, New Mexico Archeological Council, and ASNM, where she currently serves as a Trustee.

Karen is enthusiastic about her current volunteer activities in organizing and supervising a group of volunteers who have been gathering weekly at the Hibben Center of the Maxwell Museum at UNM since 2004 to archive various collections stored there. Over the past several years they have completed work on collections from Tijeras Pueblo, Pottery Mound, Tonque, and Yunque, among others, and have just begun to archive the huge Sapawe collection.

**Hayward Franklin's** academic background includes undergraduate studies in Anthropology at American University, followed by graduate work in Arizona at the University of Arizona, Tucson. His Ph.D. dissertation involved the excavation and analysis of a major Hohokam-Salado site in the San Pedro Valley. He then served as an NPS Ranger at Mesa Verde Park. Between 1974 and 1980 he directed the ceramics lab at Salmon Ruin, a large Chaco culture pueblo near Bloomfield, NM. Concurrently, he was Assistant Professor at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. After a year as a student at Albuquerque T-VI in 1980, he was hired as an instructor in Computer Programming, and remained on the faculty until his retirement from CNM in 2005. In a separate but "parallel" career, Hayward analyzed and wrote about ceramics for a number of major contract projects, most of them connected with OCA at the University of New Mexico. He was ceramic analyst on projects at Cuchillo Wash, Valencia Pueblo, and numerous smaller projects. Together with Carol Condie he completed analysis of eighteenth century ceramics from Los Ranchos Plaza, in Albuquerque. Since his retirement from teaching, he has been engaged in an intensive analysis of Pottery Mound glazeware ceramics. As a Research Associate at the Maxwell Museum, he works closely with David Phillips in his continuing research. His interest in P IV glazeware pottery has led to several recent research projects involving data from sites in the Albuquerque area. Hayward is a member of SAA, Albuquerque Archaeological Society, and serves on the Board of Trustees of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico.

**Charlie Barnes** began his serious involvement in archaeology in Arizona with the Arizona Archaeology Society in 1997, and he served on the Board of Directors of the Aqua Fria Chapter for three years, during which time he participated in the AAS Certification Program taking several classes including academic Southwest Archaeology, field school, survey techniques, lab work and others. He participated in volunteer activities such as surveying, mapping, and artifact processing. He moved to New Mexico in 2004 and became affiliated with the Grant County Archaeology Society and joined ASNM. He has been a member of the GCAS Board of Directors for 5 years (serving as Secretary). He has volunteered in excavations and artifact processing. He also participates in the New Mexico Site Watch Program. He has served 3 years on the ASNM Board of Trustees and the Certification Council.

**Doris Morgan** is completing her third year as president of ASNM and has been an active member since 1997, serving on both the Board of Trustees and (currently) the Certification Council. She has earned certification as Provisional Rock Art Surveyor, Lab Technician, and Field Crew Member. While President of Doña Ana Archaeological Society (1994-1997) she directed the organization of and chaired the 1997 ASNM Annual Meeting in Las Cruces. She co-authored/edited the history of the Doña Ana Society published in the 2000 Annual Volume, presented a paper at the ASNM Annual Meeting in El Paso (1995) and participated in the DAAS rock art recording project at Summerford Mountain. She directed DAAS members in the reconstruction of Mimbres pottery from Elk Ridge for Human Systems Research and provided like instruction to the O'Tooles at Cañada Alamosa at the request of Karl Laumbach. She taught pottery reconstruction at Doña Ana Branch Community College for Kent Museum, NMSU. Doris has catalogued and analyzed artifacts from Elk Ridge and Rayado for HSR. She has excavated sites in New Mexico, New Jersey, Majorca and Israel, and was an Earthwatch lecturer at universities, museums and other organizations for over a decade.
